UniBook is a handy resource for investigating Unicode glyphs in different fonts. It can be downloaded free at www.unicode.org/unibook. After installation, choose View...Show As and select "Index" view. Choose Options...Format, select Character Display, and only check "Blank characters not in font".

There are various helpful features. UniBook can provide some detail on code point semantics including name, canonical equivalence, and similar code points. The table highlights some useful features.
